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I was just drinking my coffee and looking out the window at the most amazing sight— a whole bunch of American Goldfinches and some Painted Buntings. The male painted bunting looks like it cannot be real-his bright blue iridescent head, fluorescent green wings, and bright red body makes you wonder who applied the paint to a plain finch. The goldfinches with their little blackcapped face. bright yellow bodies and barred wings offer a pretty contrast. Such colors! The feeders also host a family of cardinals, blue jays, sparrows, flickers (woodpeckers), red-winged blackbirds, and monk parakeets. Mourning and Asian doves gather on the ground below to feast on the dropped seeds. I only put black-oil sunflower seeds and white proso millet in my feeders. The other seeds in the common commercial feed mixes are cheap filler, mostly wasted on the birds we get here in the deep southern end of the continent. The tube feeders seem to do best for us. And yes, we cannot keep the squirrels from eating—even the so-called squirrel-proof seeders (hah!). This year we also had three weeks of robins all over the place—I've never seen anything like it! And now we have lots of Cedar waxwings flitting about in formation from tree to tree. When they land in the treetops, they blend in so well you have to look twice to notice them there. The mockingbirds are singing their hearts out, and in the distance I can hear the peacocks calling out their mating calls ("pah-keee-oh") to the peahens (the closest ones I to us are about 1/2 mile away). SPRING HAS SPRUNG!

Featured Item of the Week

Brocco-Mix sprouts— We've been experimenting with growing sprouts— the mix you have in your shares today is our first full-scale sprout project. They're a mix of assorted seeds from the Brassica family- full of antioxidants. Sprouts contain much higher quantities of these chemicals than the mature plants.



Yellow Squash— They're back, just in time for the end of the season!

Grape Tomatoes—Here's your chance to decide for yourself if all the hoopla about grape tomatoes is warranted!
